# It Doesn't Have To Be Quite So Hard

## Lesson 2

Read **Colossians 4:2-6**

1) What are the first three verses talking about?

Prayer

2) What are the last two verses talking about?

Evangelizing (sharing God with others)

**Prayer is talking to God about people.  
Evangelism is talking to people about God.**

3) What three “prayers” are described in the passage above?

- a) That God may give us a chance to share (open a door)
- b) That we use that opportunity to share (proclaim the mystery of Christ)
- c) That we speak in ways that others can understand us (proclaim it clearly)

4) According to verses 5 and 6 there are two “behaviors” we should have towards non Christians. What are they?

- a) We should be kind to them (be wise in the way we act)
- b) We should make the most of every opportunity (but not MAKE the opportunity. Be open to what the spirit is leading you to say or not say)

5) If we constantly make every conversation end up talking about God is that good evangelism or a good way to lose friends? Explain your answer.

Answers may vary - but most likely a good way to lose non-Christian friends.

- 6) According to Paul's passage is evangelism about saying certain things or living a certain way? Explain your answer.

It is both, but living a certain way will usually lead you to a chance to share certain things. Make sure that you live the Christian life you are talking about. No one will be interested in becoming a hypocrite. How do you treat your parents? How do you act when someone gets you mad? Do you let your friends copy homework off you or test answers? Do you tell dirty jokes? Do you spread gossip about people?

**Our motive must never be to win a battle or prove ourselves right, but rather to live out a life of genuine, sacrificial love. We are called by God to serve people, not to argue with them.**

- 7) According to verse 6 how should we answer someone? Gracefully (kindly)

- 8) Do we need to know what we are going to say? Yes

- 9) Should we be prepared to preach to someone for 30 minutes? Why or why not?

In general, no. We should be prepared to share as much as someone is interested in hearing. Usually that is only a few minutes at a time. There may be occasions when someone will want to hear more - and that would be the time to share longer. Let your friends show an interest in God before you babble one about something they may not be interested in. That may cause them to not be interested in the future also.

- 10) How can we be prepared to give answers to those that talk to us?

Answers could include: prayer, read the Bible, study the Bible, memorize verses from the Bible, going to church, practice sharing with a friend from church.

# Problems And Solutions

## Lesson 3

There are two difficult problems that face us as we attempt to share our faith with others:

- 1) Those we want to speak to aren't really interested because they all ready have beliefs of their own.
- 2) We don't really know what we want or need to say.

This lesson will focus on the answer to problem 2. We can't share the good news if we don't know or understand what it is.

1) Write down your definition of the word "salvation":

2) What is gravity?

the force of attraction between all masses in the universe; especially the attraction of the earth's mass for bodies near its surface (WordNet 1.6 1997)

The basic laws of gravity exist whether we want to believe they do or not. If we choose not believe in gravity that does not mean gravity will cease to exist or that it's laws will cease to exist. I can choose not to believe in gravity, but if I step off a roof top what will happen? Will I just float there because I don't believe I will fall? Not at all. And depending on the height of the roof top that could be a very hard lesson to learn.

God and his laws are a lot like gravity. You may not see God (or gravity) but God's laws are still there and in effect. When we break them we have to suffer the consequences. There is always pain. Sometimes the pain is immediate, and sometimes it does not happen for weeks, months or even years.

3) What are God's laws?

The Ten Commandments.

4) Read **Exodus 20:1-17**. Re-write each law in your own words.

Your answers may vary but here are some possibilities...

- 1) I am the only God.
- 2) Don't make statues to worship (or worship existing statues).
- 3) Don't swear using God's name (or at all).
- 4) Take a break to remember what God did for us.
- 5) Don't be disrespectful to your parents.
- 6) Don't kill anyone.
- 7) Don't have sex with someone you are not married to.
- 8) Don't take what is not yours.
- 9) Don't lie or tell gossip.
- 10) Don't want something so bad that you are willing to do anything to get it.

Laws 1-4 have to do with the way we act toward God. Laws 5-10 have to do with the way we act toward other people. Do you think any of these laws are difficult to keep? If yes, what makes them hard to keep?



5) Is it a big deal if we break any of these laws? Explain your answer.

6) What do you think will happen to us if we break any of these laws?

**We will go to hell when we die - for the rest of for ever.**

7) What is it called when we break one of these laws? **Sin.**

8) Read **Romans 6:23**. What does the Bible say will happen if we break one of these laws? **We will die (go to hell).**

How long does this punishment last? **Eternity. (for ever)**

9) Now we know about God's laws and what happens if we break them. Besides Jesus, can you name anyone that has not broken any of God's laws? (or sinned as we call it)

10) Read **Romans 3:23**. Who does the Bible say has sinned? **Everyone. (But this does not include Jesus. He did not sin.)**

We have learned what God's laws are and who has broken those laws. All we need to know now is how to escape punishment. Go back to question 1 and share your definition of salvation again.

The word "salvation" just means "saved".

11) How do you treat people when then constantly break your personal "rules of friendship"? You know the kind of stuff I mean, they talk about you behind your back, gossip about you, say they like you when you are around or when they want something from you but when you're gone they swear about you and put you down, or even worse, they don't even acknowledge that you exist. They treat you like a "nobody" or as if they don't even know you.

**Usually you don't want them as friends anymore. Sometimes you even consider them to be your enemies. In any case. You don't want to be around people that treat you like that.**

It's the same way with us and God. We have broken God's laws (God's rules of friendship) and, although he wants to be friends with us, he just can't stand to have us around while we are acting like that. It hurts his feelings. (Don't misunderstand things here. God loves all of us. He always wants us around. It's our actions that he does not like. He loves us.)

12) Read **John 3:16-18**. How do we get salvation?

**By believing that Jesus Christ has died from our sins.**

Humans have a free will - we can pick what we want to do and don't want to do. If we choose not to accept Jesus what will happen to us?

**We will go to hell when we die.**

Later, in another lesson, we will learn how to lead someone to Christ. This chapter is just to teach you fact that everyone has sinned and needs to be saved and try to make it simple for when you share the need for God with your friends. There is certainly a lot more that can be learned from the Bible about sin, its consequences, and what God is doing to help save us from sin. Actually - that is what the Bible is all about... It's the story of God and how he is trying to help us be his best friend.

Here is the simple message:

- 1 - God has Laws. (rules of friendship)
- 2 - There is sin in the world and sin is bad.
- 3 - Everyone has sinned (broken God's rules of friendship) and will receive death. (eternal punishment)
- 4 - God has provided a way for us to receive eternal life.
- 5 - We must choose Jesus as our savior and turn from our sinful life to receive eternal life with God. (and remove the punishment of death)

It would be very helpful to you if you memorized the following 3 verses:

We all have sinned - **Romans 3:23**.

We all will be punished by death - **Romans 6:23**.

God provided a way to remove that punishment - **John 3:16**.

# Adoption And Childcare

## Lesson 4

- 1) Can you remember the day you decided to ask Jesus into your life as your personal Lord and Savior? What were the events that lead up to that decision? (Were you at camp, church, alone in your room or somewhere else? What made you finally want God in your life?)
  
- 2) List one or two people that have had a significant impact on your decision to become a Christian. What was it about each person that had an effect on you?
  
- 3) Do you have any of those qualities? Do you have any different qualities that might make a person interested in being a Christian? List them below.

If a person comes to you and asks you to help them become a Christian (or a better Christian) then you have probably had a significant impact on their life. There are many versions of the “sinners prayer” or a prayer that is said to accept God into your life. A simple one has been listed below. It is a simple prayer that you can ask your friend to repeat, one line at a time, after you say it. (I would suggest that you have this, or something similar, memorized)

Dear Jesus:

Thank You for the sacrifice You made for me.

Please forgive me for all of my past sins.

I repent of these actions, and with Your help, I will change and not repeat them again.

I know I am not worthy; but, I willingly accept You as my Lord and my Savior, and I thank You for Your blessings over my family and me.

Amen

Now, your friend is a Christian, too. Be happy and rejoice with them. **They are now a child of God. They have been adopted into God's family!** The article "Dealing with post camp depression" will explain a little more about the emotions your friend may go through. The article is at the end of the packet. Next, you'll need to get your friend involved in a church.

- 4) What is it that you like best about your church and youth group? List at least three things - it can be people, activities, parts of worship or anything.

Share these things about your church with your friend. Ask them what would get them to be excited to be part of a church. Then, help them find a church... the first two recommendations are the easiest:

- 1) Recommend your church

- 2) Recommend a church that may have been in their family in the past. Make sure that it is a Christian church and not a cult church. Your youth pastor or senior pastor can help you there if you're not sure.

The third type of church you would recommend would take a little work. Take those things that your friend said would make them excited to be part of a church. Now, look for a church in your area that can meet those needs (even

if it is not your church). Again, you may need the help of your youth pastor or senior pastor to find a church that will best fit your friend's needs. The fact that you are willing to be a part of this process will mean a lot to your friend.

Lastly you'll need to check up on your friend from time to time to see how they are doing spiritually.

- 5) What do you do to stay accountable as a Christian? In case you are not sure what types of things can help you stay accountable - here are a few: Sunday School, Youth Group, Prayer Partners, Accountability Partners, Bible Studies. You may even have other programs you are a part of. List the one that works for you the best:

(If you don't belong to any of these things this might be a good time for you to get involved as well) My suggestion is to get an "accountability partner". That is someone you can trust to share your deepest needs, hurts, weaknesses, and joys with. You would meet on a regular basis. It could be weekly, every two weeks, monthly - whatever works out for you two. You meet to talk about what God is doing in your life, how you are doing, personally, as a Christian, and you pray for each other. Sometime people read the Bible and do other things - but basically it is just having another Christian to check in with. It may just be a 15 minute phone call once a week.

- 6) Do you have an accountability partner? If yes, what has that experience been like for you? Share it with the rest of the class.

If no, would you like one? This would be a good time to get a partner. If you need help setting up accountability partners talk to your youth pastor or pastor.

## Personal Notes

- 1) If you are at all serious about being evangelistic I highly recommend that you purchase the two books listed in the primary resources. I used so much of material from chapter 1 of Nick Pollard's book that I hesitated posting this lesson. So... if you really like this lesson - buy that book (and know that it is an adult oriented book - not a teen book). Duffy Robbin's book is out of print but you may still be able to get a copy online somewhere. If you can't find it - buy something else of his. His books are great.
- 2) I made a reference to articles that would be attached. I used these articles with my youth group. I wrote them for (sold them to) Barefoot Ministries. You can get these articles from [www.barefootministries.com](http://www.barefootministries.com). You can search their site for free. I think they even have some free stuff you can download for free - but you need to buy a subscription to download other things (or you can pay a per download fee). - 3) These lessons were an attempt to combine ideas from several sources. Some of the ideas presented in this lesson packet were my one but many were from the other sources.

This packet came of need to teach some of my students a better way to share their faith.
